A. EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

Annai Velankanni College, Tholayavattam, Kanyakumari District was established in 26. 05. 1987 as a self financing institution affiliated to Madurai Kamaraj University. The College is owned by Friends of Kottar Society and administered by Annai Velankanni College Administrative Board. Ever since its inception, Annai Velankanni College has been rendering great service to the local populace in the area of Higher Education without any discrimination on the basis of religion, caste and community. When Manonmaniam Sundaranar University came into being on 07.09.1990 as a teaching and affiliating University comprising the Colleges of Thoothukudi, Tirunelveli and Kanyakumari Districts, our College also became affiliated to it. Our College is a co-educational institution offering graduate, post graduate and M.Phil programmes in Arts, Science and Commerce disciplines. The College now offers ten UG programmes, eight PG programmes and five M.Phil programmes in various disciplines.

CRITERION I: Curricular Aspects

We aim at enlightening and empowering the youth of the region by providing programmes relevant to the local needs so that they can seek better employment. As an affiliated College, the College follows the curriculum framed by the affiliating University. The faculty of the College serve as members of academic bodies such as Board of Studies and contribute to the development of the curriculum by the University. The departments of the College provide necessary inputs to the development of the curriculum by the University, based on what they infer from the feedbacks on curriculum.

The introduction of Choice Based Credit System (CBCS) in the academic year 2008-2009 offers some extent of academic flexibility. Our University syllabus comprises Core, Allied, Skill Based and Non-Major Electives and value oriented subjects. The Allied, Skill Based and Non-Major Electives and value oriented subjects allow the students to learn and accumulate knowledge from outside their chosen field of study. Elective option is available for both the U.G. and the P.G. students. Non-major electives have been offered in modular form from 2009-2012 for the U.G. second year students. Separate papers on 'Environmental Studies', 'Social Value Education', and 'Personality Development' are offered compulsorily to the U.G. students in the first, second and fifth semesters respectively.

The College provides its own add-on courses for the students, the curricula for which are designed by the College.

The College ensures effective implementation of the curriculum by carrying out various activities. Industry-institute interaction is encouraged for effective operationalisation of the curriculum. The faculty are given periodical orientation programmes on curricular aspects.

To integrate the academic programmes and goal of the Institution, our College has taken several initiatives to supplement the curriculum. Departments and various Committees take efforts to conduct programmes such as recent developments/emerging trends, career guidance programmes, gender issues, environmental issues, employability and life skill classes, extension activities, skill development programmes and enrichment programmes.

Criterion II: Teaching-Learning and Evaluation

Vast majority of the people living in this part of the district in which the College is situated, hail from poor socioeconomic background. Not only they are mostly from backward communities, they are invariably first generation graduates. The presence of this College in this region is a great boon to them educationally. The College draws pride in admitting, teaching and serving them. Students are admitted on merit cum means basis. The College extends wide publicity in a planned manner through advertisements in News Papers, College Prospectus and Billboards. The admission process is handled by the Admission Committee headed by the Principal.

A lot of the students admitted are from economically weaker and disadvantaged sections of the society. Taking into account, the backgrounds of our students, the College makes it a point to support their studies economically, by ensuring that the existing government scholarships are availed by all the eligible students. The Management also supports the students who are genuinely in need of financial help. Bridge courses at the beginning of the Under Graduate Programmes are conducted to make the students cope with the requirements of a Higher Educational Institution. Bridge course classes cover basics of their respective subjects, basics of English Language and basics of computer literacy. At the end of the bridge course, an entry level test is conducted to assess the knowledge level of the students and address their needs.

The teaching, learning and evaluation schedules are organized through the College Handbook, Department Annual Plan and the Course file. The faculty are provided with orientation programmes to ensure there is continuous improvement in the teaching learning process. There are sufficient opportunities available to the students to make learning a student centric process and the College puts up continuous efforts to make student centric learning process more prevalent and be fruitful. Opportunities are provided to the students to nurture critical thinking, creativity, scientific temper, to expose them to advanced level of knowledge and to make them life-long learners. Improvement in the quality of the teachers makes improvement in the teaching learning processes. So efforts are on to develop the teaching skills as well as subject expertise of the teachers.

Criterion III: Research, Consultancy and Extension

To address the issues connected with research, the College has a Research Committee. The Research Committee takes efforts to publish an annual ISSN numbered multi-disciplinary research journal. All the departments organize conferences/seminars/symposia in emerging trends of their respective areas. Faculty and students are encouraged to present papers in seminars/publish papers in research journals. The College has no recognised research centre. Faculty are encouraged to do research. There are twenty Ph.D holders among the faculty and twenty four are pursuing research for Ph.D. Eminent researchers who visit at the time of conferences as resource persons and the opportunity to do projects for the Post Graduate and M.Phil students as part of curriculum and the opportunity to take part and present papers in conferences and orientation and awareness programmes help to create research culture and aptitude among students. Net connectivity, E-resources and the infrastructure facilities available in M.Phil departments contribute to a large extent, in helping the students present/publish papers. Our Faculty and students published 173 Research papers in reputed National/International Journals, Eighty Three research paper presentations have been made in National/International seminars.

Criterion IV: Infrastructural and Learning Resources

The Institution is aware that infrastructural facilities facilitate effective and efficient conduct of educational programmes and promote academic excellence. The Institution creates necessary infrastructure continuously, based on the increasing requirements. The Institution is well equipped with physical infrastructural facilities like adequate classrooms, laboratories, libraries, staff rooms, waiting shed, auditorium, administrative block, vehicle shed, health centre, canteen, tracks, playgrounds and toilets satisfying all kinds of needs. All infrastructural facilities are optimally used. Despite financial constraints, the College makes efforts to cope with the demands of the times, by providing IT facilities like net connectivity, INFLIBNET facilities and LCD projectors. The Institution provides transportation facilities too for the students to reduce the hardships due to inadequacy of public/private transport services. The Institution has a vast lush-green campus of 40.19 acres. The secluded and serene campus provides a pleasant working environment. The library is augmented annually. The library supports the teaching-learning process as per requirements. There are 16599 books and 21 journals as on 21.04.2016. All laboratories are well equipped. Augmentation and maintenance of laboratories is carried out under the supervision of Heads of the Departments. Maintenance of IT works is carried out by trained technical personal of the College.

Criterion V: Student Support and Progression

The Institution publishes its updated Prospectus every academic year. The Institution takes care to ensure all necessary information of the institution, a student or parent wants to know at the time of admission, find place in the Prospectus. The information about the Institution and all its Departments are uploaded in its website: www.annaiCollege.org. The Handbook covers information like Administrative Structure, Management Committee, Vision and Mission Statement, Brief History of the College, Academic details, Committees, Scholarships, Awards and Endowments, Co and Extra-curricular activities, Rules and Regulations of the College, Academic Calendar etc. Reopening date, commencement of classes for freshers, working days, holidays, the date of commencement of internal tests, model tests and the last working day for each semester are scheduled and printed in the academic calendar. A copy of the Handbook is issued to all the students and the staff members. Schedules printed in the Handbook are seldom changed and teachers are expected to strictly adhere to them in finishing their teaching, revision and evaluation exercises. The Institution ensures cent percent commitment and accountability to what is given in the Website, Prospectus and the Handbook.

Special talents and skills of the students are identified and there are opportunities to hone and develop their skills. They are encouraged to take part in programmes/competitions conducted by outside agencies. There are enough opportunities, such as, inter departmental competitions, cultural competitions, literary competitions, quizzes, debates etc provided to them to develop their skills in the College. The Fine Arts Club, Mother Tongue Cell, English Literary Club College Magazine, Department Magazines provide the platform for the students to develop and showcase their talents. In sports and games, our College teams participate in University competitions regularly.

There is an elected Students' council, consisting of class representatives. Students' council is a forum where students raise issues connected with their common needs and grievances.

Remedial Classes are conducted for the identified slow learners.

The Placement Cell of our College organizes orientation /awareness/motivational Programmes on higher education and employment opportunities. They organize coaching classes for competitive exams. Over the years, the alumni of the Annai Velankanni College have been able to getting placed as army men, school teachers (Government/Private) and quite a few in Higher Educational/ Research Institutes. There are successful entrepreneurs/businessmen and social activists working for the welfare of the people/society among our alumni.

Annai Velankanni College can lay claim to the credit that through a vibrant scholarship section in the College office, it is ensured that students avail the benefits of all Government scholarships meant for them. Full assistance is provided to students to obtain Government scholarship. Issue and collection of scholarship application, opening of bank account, online

registration etc. are done through the College Office because of which maximum number of students are able to avail the Government scholarships without any strain. Apart from Government Scholarships, there are other financial supports provided by the Management to genuinely needy students. The amount spent in this regard and the number of students benefitted every year are in itself a real indicator of the socio-economic background of the students. Students' welfare fund, for which funds are mobilized by staff and students, to support poor and meritorious students to continue their studies.

Criterion VI: Governance, Leadership and Management

As enshrined in the Vision and Mission statement of the College, the objective of the founding-fathers of the College is the empowerment of the rural population of this area. Their foresightedness is best exemplified by the fact that even now, after 29 years of its inception, the College continues to attract first generation graduates and the first generation graduates hailing from this locality form the major chunk of the student population of the College. The College aims to mould them into a confident youth, one who can successfully conquer the hitherto unknown barriers to become a proud citizen of this country, contributing to its growth and development by being an employee/employer.

Annai Velankanni College Administrative Board, the Management of Annai Velankanni College, is the guiding force that leads the College in its journey of realizing the Vision and Mission statement of the College, the dream of its founding fathers. The Management is very particular that the improvement and sustainment in quality achieved in the institution is student oriented and beneficial to the students first and foremost.

The broader guidelines for the functioning of the College are framed based upon the Vision and Mission statement of the College by the Management. The Principal coordinates closely with the Management, Faculty, Administrative Staff and Students and ensures the effective and efficient functioning of the College. Ex-officio Committee meetings, Staff Council meetings, Staff meetings, Department meetings and Students Council meetings and also through informal interactions, the Principal ensures that the curricular, co-curricular and extra-curricular activities and student support activities are carried out with utmost efficiency. An atmosphere conducive to learning prevails in the College.

Professional development of the faculty is ensured through arranging continuous rejuvenation programmes in the College and through the encouragement to attend programmes conducted in other Colleges/institutes. To maintain teacher quality, the teachers are encouraged to involve in research activities and participate and present papers in conferences and seminars at the national and international levels.

Committees are formed and each Committee plans and fulfils the responsibilities assigned to it. The academic units are controlled by the Heads of the Departments and Faculty members. The responsibilities of the

administrative units are decentralized with everyone's role clearly defined. The primary objective of the institution is to enable the students to cope with the demands of the employment market through effective transaction of the curricular and co-curricular aspects.

Criterion VII: Innovations and Best Practices

Every possible effort is made to keep the campus eco-friendly. Plastic free culture is being developed inside the College campus. We have been consistent in our efforts to make the campus green and clean and we have formed a Campus Improvement and Eco Club and a Gardening and Campus Cleanliness Committee for fulfilling those efforts. The plants inside the campus are documented. Rainwater Harvesting System, restricting use of plastics, planting saplings on the campus are some of the initiatives that motivate the students to protect the environment. Our students lend helping hands to the District administration in taking animal census of the district. The College has a lot of electric and electronic equipment. The College is striving to inculcate austerity measures among faculty members and students in using water and electricity. The class rooms receive sufficient day light and are well-ventilated, facilitating the conservation of electricity.

The College has a proper waste disposal system. Carbon emission is kept to the minimum in the campus, as we do not use refrigerator, air-conditioners and other carbon emitting equipment on large scale.

Regarding the issue of e-waste, currently the College manages the issue by arranging regular maintenance of electrical and electronic equipment to reduce e-waste. After life time the electrical and electronic equipment are sold as scrap.

International Days are celebrated to create environmental awareness among students. Two of the best practices followed by us worth mentioning are

- i) Students' Welfare Fund and
- ii) Involvement of all the staff members in Monitoring Students' Discipline.

2.2 Catering to Student Diversity

2.2.1 How does the institution cater to the needs of differently-abled students and ensure adherence to government policies in this regard?

All our students hail from rural and backward region in and around the College. Almost all of them are first generation graduates, if not first generation learners. Any particular class room is predominantly occupied by slow learners and below average students rather than above average and advanced learners. Every Department conducts entry level test at the commencement of the programme in the major subject. Marks scored at the entry level test and the score at XII std form the basis for assessing the students' needs in terms of knowledge and skills before the commencement of the programme.

- **Bridge/Remedial courses**

Identification of advanced learners

The advanced learners are identified based on the performance in entry level test, performance of the students in internal assessment tests and the interaction of the Class in-charges/ faculty with students. The advanced learners are identified and encouraged to achieve a higher degree of excellence through the Academic Brilliance Cell. Encouraging them in participation and presentation of papers in various seminars/conferences, attending workshops, writing home assignments

and taking part in intra and inter-collegiate competitions. They are given special attention and encouragement by the faculty members. The meritorious students, who are economically weaker, are given financial assistance by the Management and the Students welfare fund.

Response of the institution

- The institution responds to the learning needs of the advanced learners by encouraging the students to secure high marks and fetch University ranks.
- Motivating to appear in competitive examinations.
- Encouraging the students to use internet facility in the College through computer centre.
- Encouraging the students to use the library to update their subject knowledge.
- Helping them to subscribe 'The Hindu newspaper' at concession rate and motivating them to read it to keep their knowledge up-to-date.

2.2.6 How does the institute collect, analyze and use the data and information on the academic performance (through the programme duration) of the students at risk of drop out (students from the disadvantaged sections of society, physically challenged, slow learners, economically weaker sections etc. who may discontinue their studies if some sort of support is not provided)?

The Class in-charge keeps track of our students' academic performance, regularity to classes, interest or lack of interest in studies, class room behavior and is in regular touch with the students and therefore the Class in-charge is in a better position to spot those students who are at risk of drop out. Also it is the responsibility of the Class in-charge to pay special attention to those students who are from the disadvantaged sections of society, physically challenged, slow learners, economically weaker sections etc., who are naturally at a greater risk of getting dropped out if some sort of support is not provided. When a Class in-charge finds a student who is irregular to classes and is indifferent to studies, and if the Class in-charge has sufficient reason to believe that the student is on the verge of discontinuing studies, he brings it to the notice of the Head of the Department and with the knowledge of the Head of the Department, he refers the student to the Principal or Counselling cell or the Student Welfare Fund depending upon the necessity. If the reason is his inability to cope with the studies, then the Department itself takes efforts to help.

2.3 Teaching-Learning Process

2.3.1 How does the College plan and organise the teaching, learning and evaluation schedules? (Academic calendar, teaching plan, evaluation blue print, etc.)

The Handbook Committee in consultation with the Principal prepares the academic calendar. Reopening date, commencing of classes for the freshers, working days, holidays, date of commencement of internal tests, model tests and the last working day for each semester are scheduled and printed in the calendar. A copy of it is issued to all the students and the staff members. Dates specified in the plan are rarely changed and teachers are expected to strictly adhere to them in finishing their teaching, revision and evaluation exercises.

All the faculty members are required to prepare a course file spread over five units and topics of the prescribed syllabus. The course file reflects what the faculty is planning to do for the current semester. Each and every theory paper is divided into five units. Teaching schedules are accordingly planned so as to complete each unit in the allotted hours. The course file contains the contents to be covered, the kinds of teaching aids and tools to be used inside the class room. The teaching plan is submitted to the Principal also.

As per the University norms, there are three internal tests. And there is a model test at the end of the semester. The Examination Cell conducts these tests on the dates mentioned in the Handbook as per the directions of the Principal. The distribution of the marks for the internals, the externals, projects and practicals appear in the College Handbook. Apart from these the faculty members conduct class tests.

As a Class in-charge interacts with students individually at personal level, when he comes across students with academic, personal and psycho-social issues he takes steps to support the students. In case of academic related issues, the Department takes efforts to sort out and find remedial measures. As far as academic Counseling is concerned, not only the Class in-charge but the subject teacher and/or the Head of the Department also do it whenever they have sufficient reason to believe that a particular student is below bar in studies.

If the Class in-charge comes across students with issues such as personal and psycho-social, the help of the Counseling Cell is sought and with the knowledge of the Head of the Department, the student is referred to the Counseling Cell. The Counseling Cell takes efforts to help the student out of the difficulties. Whenever the Cell finds it beyond its limitations, the services of the expert Counselor of the College is sought.

Placement Cell provides guidance services connected with employment and higher education. Placement Cell, Human Values Development Cell, Human Resources and Motivation Cell regularly organise orientation/guidance programmes.

The complete evaluation process as well as the exam schedule is communicated to the students through College Handbook and through HODs/ Class in-charges. The schedules of the internal tests are provided in the College Handbook. There is a schedule for setting the question papers for the internals, valuation of answer sheets, submission of mark-list to the Class in- charges and the displaying of the consolidated mark-list at the end of the semester. This schedule is strictly adhered to. The procedure in place for internals applies to the Model Examinations conducted at the end of every semester. The class tests are conducted by the subject teachers at frequent intervals.

➤ **University**

The complete evaluation process as laid out by the University and the additions made to it by the institution are adhered to in letter and spirit by the institution. All rules and regulations and communications regarding the conduct of University Exams are communicated to the students promptly and are implemented strictly. Every possible measure is taken to ensure the students to attain the minimum attendance required

to be eligible for appearing the University Exams. Because of the sincere efforts of the Institution in this regard, our students used to register a high percentage of attendance every semester and appear for the University Examinations without any hitch.

The institution is largely successful in achieving that. The institution takes efforts to meet the growing needs of the times.

4.1.2 Detail the facilities available for

a) Curricular and co-curricular activities – classrooms, technology enabled learning spaces, seminar halls, tutorial spaces, laboratories, botanical garden, Animal house, specialized facilities and equipment for teaching, learning and research etc.

1. The administrative block is a three storied building. The ground floor consists of the Principal's office, Secretary's office, President's office, Treasurer's office and the College Office. The first floor accommodates staff room of the Department of Bio- Technology, P.G lab of Bio-Technology and P.G Bio - Technology class rooms. The second floor of the administrative block is for U.G Bio-Technology class rooms and the P.G. Department Libraries of Mathematics, Physics, Chemistry, Commerce and English.
2. The main block is a three storied building. The ground floor consists of the U.G lab of Bio-Technology, U.G lab of Chemistry, U.G. Chemistry store, the staff room of the Department of Chemistry, Health Room and two class rooms. An annexe in the ground floor of the Main Block accommodates the store room of N.S.S. The first floor has U.G. Lab of Zoology, General Library, the staff room of the Department of Commerce and four class rooms. An annexe between the first and second floor accommodates the staff room of the Department of Mathematics. The second floor consists of the staff room of the Department of Business Administration and eight class rooms.
3. The Computer Science Block is a three storied one. The ground floor is for the P.G. lab of Chemistry, P.G. Chemistry store, M.Phil Chemistry Research Lab, M.Phil Chemistry class room

and four class rooms. The first floor consists of the staff room of the Department of the Physics, M.Phil. Physics class room, M. Phil. Physics Research Lab, U.G. Physics Lab, P.G. Physics Lab, U.G Computer Science Lab and a class room. The second floor accommodates the staff room of the Department of Computer Science, Computer Centre, P.G. Lab of Computer Science and five class rooms.

4. The South Block is a two storied building. The ground floor consists of the staff room of the Department of Tamil, P.G. Tamil Library, Physical Director's Room and three class rooms. An annexe in the ground floor accommodates the canteen. The first floor has a room for the Exam Cell, and five class rooms.
5. The ground floor of the Library Block accommodates the staff room of the Department of English, Eight class rooms and the office of the NAAC Steering Committee. The first floor, which is for a spacious library, is under construction. There is a proposal to construct second floor also.

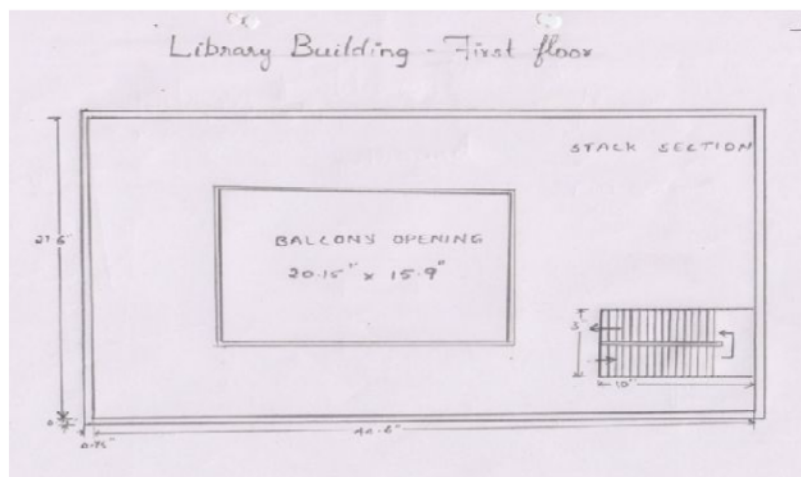

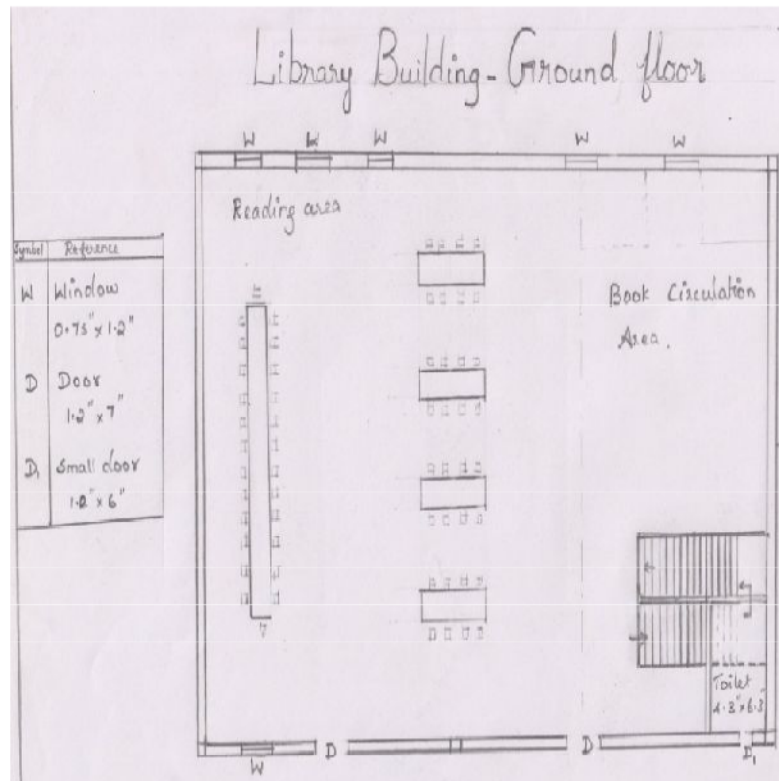

- Government scholarship is available for all students from SC/ST and OBC.
- The SC/ST Cell identifies the students and they guide them to apply for the Scholarship.

- The SC/ST cell conducts awareness programmes on the opportunities available to the SC/ST students in higher education and employment.
- **Physically challenged/differently abled students**
 - There are ramps and separate toilets for their use. They have peers to take care of them, escort them to their classes and help them in their studies. College takes special efforts to enable physically challenged students to secure scholarships offered by government agencies.
 - So far the College had the opportunity to serve a lone visually challenged student. She was provided with the lessons in audio records. She was provided with the facility of scribes from the College during University examinations.
- **Overseas students**
 - Presently there are no overseas students in our College.
- **Students to participate in various competitions/National and International**
 - Students are encouraged to participate in various competitions conducted by various agencies. Students are motivated to participate in cultural and sports in University, State level and National level events. Deserving students are selected and deputed to participate in those competitions. Guidance is given at all stages from filling up applications, collecting information, data and training them for the competitions. Free attendance is given to them. Travelling expenses are provided from the College.
- **Medical assistance to students: health centre, health insurance**
 - The College has special concern for the health and hygiene of the students. The College has a Health Room with a first aid kit. The students who fall ill are given immediate medical treatment in the nearby Public Health Centre.
 - Health awareness programmes such as Cancer Awareness Programme, Thyroid Awareness Programme and Awareness on Naturopathy Medicine were organized.
 - RRC organizes blood group identification drive for all first year students.
 - Apollo 10% discounts cards are distributed for the staff and students for getting medicines at reduced rates.
 - Thyroid Testing Camp in association with DDRC SRL Diagnostic service, Marthandam was organized.
 - Poster making competition on 'Save Heart' was conducted.

- **Organizing coaching classes for competitive exams**
 - Coaching classes for TNPSC and Banking Services examinations are being conducted.
 - Hindi classes are being conducted to improve the opportunity in getting central government jobs.
- **Skill development (spoken English, computer literacy, etc.,)**
 - Bridge course for freshers is conducted for a week to refresh their knowledge in English.
 - Certificate Course in Spoken English is conducted for improving the spoken English skills of the students.
 - Computer literacy classes are arranged for the students to learn the basics of computer language. Computer related Certificate courses are offered.
 - Narration of moral stories, speech by students, pronunciation practice, recitation of poems, skit, mime and literary quiz are encouraged among the students through English and Mother Tongue Cell. Guest lectures are also arranged by Mother Tongue Cell.
 - The College also invites Guest speakers from the industry which provides regional and global employment opportunities for the students.
 - Placement Cell frequently organizes programmes on career guidance and employment.
- **Support for 'slow learners'**
 - All the Departments provide remedial classes and peer learning which help the slow learners to cope with their academic needs.
 - Simplified study material is provided to the slow learners.
 - If students are absent for a long period then their parents are contacted and corrective measures taken.
 - Students who have backlogs of previous semesters are encouraged to attend remedial classes held after class hours.
 - Advanced learners help them with the difficult unit. Frequent tests are conducted to improve their learning.
 - The class in-charges and faculty members keep constant touch with slow learners and encourage and motivate them to do well in examinations.
- **Exposures of students to other institution of higher learning/ corporate/ business house etc.**
 - All the Departments arrange Industrial visits for the students to gain additional knowledge in the subjects they learn. Industrial visits invariably include industries, research institutes, research laboratories and places of subject importance. The Departments depute the students to conference, seminars, workshops and cultural fests organized by other institutions. Students are also

taken to Book Exhibition and Science Exhibition conducted at other institutions.

- College Magazine is published every academic year end and the Students contribute articles in English, Tamil and Malayalam to the College Magazine.

- All India Radio officials Dr.M.Thankavel the Announcer and Miss.M.S.Asha, the Programme executive visited our campus and conducted a live program “Valagaththin Vasal” and it was broad coasted live from Annai Velankanni College on 3rd January 2016 from 10.00 a.m. to 11.00 a.m. In that program 10 of our students participated and the theme of the programme was Protection of Environment.

The Class in-charges maintain a profile of their students, which includes the personal and academic information of the students. This helps the Class in-charges to gauge the strengths and weaknesses of the students and to arrange necessary help. The Class in-charges, the faculty members and the respective Heads provide academic counselling to the students who are in need of support and assistance. Remedial classes are arranged for slow learners.

➤ **Personal Counselling**

The Class in-charges personally interact with the students and take care of the student's academic and personal problems. The Class

in-charges closely monitor the growth, progress and behaviour of the students. The class in-charges, respective Heads and the counselling Cell provide personal counseling, if required

➤ **Career Counselling**

Career counselling is provided to the students by the Placement Cell. In addition, the Departments also provide subject-specific career guidance to the final year students.

➤ **Psycho-social Counselling**

The College has a Counselling Cell with staff representation from all the Departments. Special training is given to the members of the Counselling Cell. This Cell takes care of psycho-social aspect of the counselling. Students, who are in need of the assistance of the Counselling Cell, are directed to the Cell by the Principal/Heads/Class in-Charges. Based on need, the Cell seeks the support of the College Counsellor.

6.1.2 What is the role of top Management, Principal and Faculty in design and implementation of its quality policy and plans?

Top Management

- Top Management frames and formulates Motto, Vision and Mission for the College.
- The top Management meets regularly every month and formulates plans and broader guidelines for the growth and development of the College.
- The Management's decisions are communicated to the faculty through the Principal or directly by the Management through staff meetings.
- Top Management meets the teaching faculty regularly at the beginning and at the end of every semester. During those meetings, Management throws light on what is expected of the faculty, gives guidance, points out inadequacies and gives reminders so that the faculty remains on course.
- Top Management meets the faculty Department wise once every semester. The University results are analysed in that meeting and the teaching staff are encouraged to continue the good work and deficiency, if any, are pointed out. Also the teaching staff are asked to speak about Department level requirements and grievances. Top Management solicits suggestions from the teaching staff for the growth and development of the Department in that meeting.
- The Management never hesitates to encourage and appreciate whenever something noteworthy is achieved by either staff or students and when occasion demands, never fails to reprimand.
- Ex-officio Committee, comprising of the Management, Principal and the Staff Secretary, monitors, reviews and ensures the implementation of plans as communicated to the staff through staff meetings and also the other decisions taken at the staff meetings and Staff Council meetings.

Principal

- The broader guidelines laid out by the Management serve as the guiding principles for the Principal to act. The Government and the University also provide guidance from time to time on various issues connected with students' welfare and academic affairs. As and when required, the Principal consults the Staff Council. Through staff meetings, Department meetings and one-to-one meetings with staff, Principal provides/receives guidance/suggestions for improvement to/from the staff.

Faculty

- Teaching staff are represented in the Staff Council by the Heads of the Departments and the non-teaching staff are represented by the Office Superintendent. The Principal seeks suggestions from the Staff

Council as and when required, on matters related with the curricular, co-curricular, extra-curricular activities and any other academic or discipline related issues of importance. Before attending the Staff Council, the Heads of the Departments and the Office Superintendent gather inputs from their colleagues on issues to be discussed in the Staff Council. After the Staff Council meeting, they communicate the decisions to their colleagues. On staff meetings, staff express their opinion on issues brought to discussion by the Principal or Management. Faculty look after the implementation part of the plans and policies.

6.1.3 What is the involvement of the leadership in ensuring?

➤ **The policy statements and action plans for fulfillment of the stated mission**

The top Management of the College frames the Vision and Mission Statement of the College keeping in mind the needs of the local populace. Committees such as, Placement Cell, Religious Harmony Cell, Computer Education Cell, Spoken English Cell, National Service Scheme, Red Ribbon Club, Youth Red Cross, Women Cell, Consumer Club, Student Welfare Committee, SC/ST Cell, Health Centre, Human Resources and Motivation Cell, Human Values Development Cell, Neo Navigate, Research Committee etc. take efforts to materialize the policy statements found place in the Vision and Mission Statement. At Department level, the Departments take efforts to inculcate the ideals found place in the Vision and Mission statement of the College in the minds of the students by organizing relevant activities.

➤ **Formulation of action plans for all operations and incorporation of the same into the institutional strategic plan**

The responsibility to formulate action plans for all operations for the fulfillment of the stated mission lies with the Committees concerned and the Departments. The Committees and Departments convene meetings and chalk-out plans and get the consent of the Principal/Management for implementation. Once they get the nod of the Principal/Management, the plans become part of the institutional strategic plan. Those activities have to be carried out regularly. The top Management lends all possible support and encouragement to ensure that the activities are carried out diligently.

➤ **Interaction with stakeholders**

The top Management ensures that there is regular interaction with the following stakeholders, viz, the staff members, the students, the parents, the alumni.

Through Staff Council, Staff meetings, Department meetings and through informal one-to-one meetings

entrusting responsibilities to individuals or Departments or Committees. The Principal monitors the progress either formally by convening meetings or through informal queries and reminders. The staff makes suggestions for improvements through the Staff Council and through the staff meetings or through informal one to one meetings. Suggestions from staff are well received by the Management and are deliberated at the monthly Administrative Board meetings of the Management and are accepted for implementation if the Administrative Board finds merit in the suggestions. Evaluations are done from time to time at the appropriate forums and necessary changes are incorporated, if required.

- Ex-officio Cell takes up the responsibility of monitoring and evaluating policies and plans of the institution for effective implementation and improvement from time to time.

6.1.7 How does the College delegate authority and provide operational autonomy to the Departments/units of the institution and work towards decentralized governance system?

- Yes. The College delegates authority and provides operational autonomy to the Departments / units of the institution and work towards decentralized governance system and does it with sufficient checks and balances.
- There are parameters and guidelines laid out by the Management taking into account the socio-economic background of the students. The decentralized governance system of our College works within those parameters and guidelines. The Management reviews the functioning of the College regularly.
- The Principal is the Head of the institution. He takes advice from the Staff Council on curricular, co-curricular, extra-curricular activities of the College. The Departments take care of the curricular activities and the Department level co-curricular and extra-curricular activities. The College level co-curricular and extra-curricular activities are entrusted to the concerned Committees by the Principal. The Departments, various Committees and individual staff members are responsible for the planning and effective implementation of the tasks assigned to them. Principal sets targets for the staff to achieve as far as the curricular, co-curricular, extra-curricular activities are concerned. He reports to the Management regularly and seeks advice from the Management on crucial issues.

- The Staff Council consists of all the Heads of the Departments, the Staff Secretary and the Office superintendent. The Staff Council is convened by the Principal at regular intervals.
- The Heads of the Departments run the affairs of the Departments. At the Department meetings, the Department level activities are chalked-out and the responsibilities assigned to the staff. The activities so planned are put into practice with the consent of the Principal. At the time of the result analysis every semester, the Management and the Principal review the functioning of the Department.
- The Committees chalk-out their plans at their meetings and carry them out with the consent of the Principal.
- Office Superintendent assigns duty to every section and it is the duty of the section to complete the work to the satisfaction of the Office Superintendent.

6.1.8 Does the College promote a culture of participative Management? If 'yes' indicate the levels of participative Management.

- Yes. The College promotes a culture of participative Management by having communication channels open with all stakeholders, viz, staff, students, alumni and parents at all levels.
- The top Management meets once in a month. The decisions, if required, are communicated to the staff either through the Principal or at the time of staff meetings. The Management is receptive to suggestions. For the suggestions to be considered by the top Management, they are expected to be made through proper channel.
- The Ex-officio Committee, comprising of the top Management, the Principal and the Staff Secretary meets at the first opportunity immediately after every Staff Council and every staff meeting. The Ex-officio Committee reviews the minutes of the Staff Council/staff meeting, makes suggestions, provides support for effective implementation and monitors the progress.
- The top Management, Principal, all the staff members (both teaching and non-teaching) attend the Parent Teacher Association meetings arranged every semester. Parents take active part in the interactive session and express their views. Feedback questionnaires are randomly distributed class wise. Opportunity is provided to the parents to express their views/opinions/suggestions for improvement when they visit the Departments. The inputs, thus received from parents, are considered for implementation at appropriate forums.
- The general body of the Alumni Association meets once every year. The former students share their experiences at the work places and at the higher educational institutes.
- The Staff Council advises the Principal on issues related to curricular, co-curricular and extra-curricular activities and all other activities

connected with the welfare of the students. Important decisions are announced to the staff at staff meetings in order to take the staff members into confidence. Principal can obtain feedback/suggestions from them on important announcements immediately during the meeting itself. And at times staff are involved in a discussion to arrive at decisions.

- At the Departments, the Heads of the Departments convene the Department meetings. Department level activities are discussed at the Department meetings and decisions arrived at. Implementation is with the consent of the Principal.
- Various Committees are constituted by the Principal to carry out co-curricular, extra-curricular and other student support activities. The Committees convene meetings, chalk-out plans, get the consent of Principal and implement them.
- Student's Council consists of representatives from all the classes. There is a Student Secretary and a Staff Advisor.-their grievances-conduct of functions. Student representatives raise their grievances at the Student's Council meetings. Student representatives assist in organizing of various functions in the College.
- Class Committee meetings are conducted once a semester. The Class in-charges help the students redress their grievances, if any, through appropriate channels.

6.2.3 Describe the internal organizational structure and decision making process.

- Annai Velankanni College, Tholayavattam, Kanyakumari District is owned by Friends of Kottar Society and administered by Annai Velankanni College Administrative Board. The Annai Velankanni College Administrative Board looks after the administration of the College and formulates the broader guidelines within which the College has to function and fixes targets to be achieved. The Annai Velankanni College Administrative Board meets once in a month.
- Principal is the Chairman of the Staff Council and he seeks suggestions from Staff Council regarding the academic affairs of the College. Principal gives shape to what the 'Annai Velankanni College Administrative Board' visualises. Academic/curricular activities are coordinated by the Heads of the Departments at Department level. Co curricular and extracurricular activities are carried out by various Committees.

6.2.4 Give a broad description of the quality improvement strategies of the institution for each of the following

- Teaching & Learning
 - The College works for the minimum of ninety days every semester and it is ensured that all working days are optimally utilised.
 - Regular attendance of the students is insisted.
 - There are three internal tests every semester as per University norms.
 - A three hour model test is conducted every semester.

 - Staff prepares a detailed course file at the beginning of every semester and strictly adheres to it.
 - Orientation programmes for the staff on 'Teaching and Learning' are conducted regularly.
 - Top scorers in each Department and University Rank Holders are honoured at the College Day function.
 - Well equipped Laboratory support
 - Power point Presentations
 - College library is well-equipped with 16723 books, 14 journals in addition to the e-books and digital resources, and it is complemented by the Department libraries.
 - College provides opportunity to the teachers to attend orientation and refresher courses to make improvements in teaching.

- Bridge course before the commencement of the classes for the first year students.

- Research & Development
 - INFLIBNET facility to support research activities.
 - Additionally, the College has internet facilities.
 - The College encourages all the faculty members to participate in various research seminars/ workshops/ conferences.
 - National and state-level seminars are organized to promote research culture.
 - Eminent scientists and speakers are invited from research institutions, Universities and industries to share the latest development in the respective fields.
 - The College has a Research Committee to promote research aptitude among staff and students. Work is in progress to bring out a multi-disciplinary research journal.
 - As of now, the College doesn't have research centres. But it has five M.Phil. Departments. The College encourages its staff to do Ph.D. Also the College encourages its staff and students to publish research articles in national/international journals. Encourages its staff and students to present papers in Seminars/ Symposia/ Conferences.
 - Subscribing research journals
 - Acquiring research related instruments
- Community engagement
 - Social Activities for Village Empowerment (SAVE), comprising of the three NSS units, YRC, RRC, Consumer Club and Campus Improvement and Eco club, carries out community activities. Organises awareness programmes, camps, rallies in and around the College. Celebrates international days. This academic year (2015-16) being dedicated to Community Services, special thrust to programmes targeting the under-developed backward community surrounding the College.
 - The three units of NSS conduct annual camps every year.
 - Visits and services to orphanages and old-age homes.
 - Departments also carry out extension activities/community services.
- Human resource Management
 - There is a Human Resources and Motivation Cell. The Cell conducts motivational programmes for the students at regular

- To improve the performances of the students in examinations, we have result analysis after the publishing of University results once in every semester.
- Daily report is maintained by the Principal and communicated to the Management.
- Handbook, Magazine and the annual report provide adequate information about the College to the stakeholders.

Committees are constituted with clearly defined roles for carrying out various activities. Departments are also assigned clearly defined tasks to accomplish, apart from academic affairs. The Management and the Principal are in constant touch with the Heads of the Departments and Conveners of the Committees. Moral and Financial support is always made available. The students generally prefer oral representation. By contacting their respective Class in-charges and HODs, the students get their grievances resolved. INNOVATIONS AND BEST PRACTICES

7.1 Environment Consciousness

7.1.1 Does the Institute conduct a Green Audit of its campus and facilities?

Yes. The College has a vast, beautiful, green and eco-friendly campus. The College has taken many efforts to maintain the eco-friendly environment. The College has a beautiful avenue with Casuarina trees. The College campus provides a pleasant atmosphere for students.

In the College campus, there are variety of trees, shrubs and flowering plants. Two gardeners nurture the plants (watering, applying manure, pruning, etc). The College campus is complete with different kind of trees including coconut trees, mango trees, teak, etc. Regular weeding and fortification of the top soil with fertilizers keep the garden evergreen.

The Campus Improvement and Eco Club and Gardening and Cleanliness Committee play an important role in keeping the environ of the campus evergreen. The Campus Improvement and Eco Club made a survey in our campus and according to the survey, there are 436 trees in our College. The club labeled some of the plants with their botanical names and displayed important quotations regarding environmental protection. To create awareness about the necessity of saving 'Environment' among the students, the Club celebrates International Days such as Hiroshima Day and World Ozone Day.

7.1.2 What are the initiatives taken by the College to make the campus eco- friendly?

Energy conservation

Reminders are displayed in class rooms to save electricity. Students as well as staff are instilled the habit of switching the electricity appliances of when not in use. As the class rooms are well-ventilated and receive sufficient day light, use of electricity is kept to the minimum.

Use of renewable energy

The institution has no mechanism for the use of renewable energy.

Water harvesting

Rain water harvesting pits are available in every building. These pits help in recharging the ground water and thereby increase ground water level. The topography of our campus is such that it can hold and absorb all rain water that falls within our campus.

Efforts for Carbon Neutrality

The institution has a lot of greenery in its campus. Saplings are planted at regular intervals. To reduce the carbon-di-oxide level inside the class rooms, money plants (*Epipremnum Scindapsus Aureum*) are kept. Money plants release more oxygen. Some of our staff members practicing the 'car pooling' which reduces the emission of carbon-di-oxide and carbon monoxide which leads to air pollution. Carbon emitting equipment are kept to a minimum inside the campus.

Plantation

Green environment is preserved in our campus. Approximately 436 trees are there in the campus. Every year saplings are planted in the premises. Department of Zoology has an organic farm inside the campus to generate awareness regarding the harmful effects of pesticides and insecticides on environment among the students.

Hazardous waste management

In order to make the campus plastic-free, awareness programmes are arranged and necessary guidelines are drafted by Eco club. In canteen, the beverages are supplied in paper cups and glass tumblers. The usage of plastic bags is banned in the campus.

E-waste management

Regular Maintenances of electrical and electronic goods are carried out in labs and class rooms by the electricians and service engineers to reduce e-waste. After life time is over the computers are sold as scrap to the vendors from Madurai who recycle its parts.

7.2 Innovations

7.2.1 Give details of innovations introduced during the last four years which have created a positive impact on the functioning of the College.

Campus Radio

Campus Radio Programme was started in the academic year 2014-2015. Every day during lunch interval the programme is broadcasted live. As per schedule, the students perform the programme every day. Campus Radio Programme includes General Awareness, Employment Tips, Health Tips, Thirukkural, Jokes, Importances of the Day.

SAVE (Social Activities for Village Empowerment)

College – community interaction is the strength of our College. Since its inception, the College attaches lot of importance to organising community-oriented activities and encouraging students to take part in those activities in large numbers so that they become service oriented and thus contributing to good citizenship and nation building. 'SAVE' was formed in our College in the academic year 2015-16, comprising the NSS units, RRC, YRC, Consumer club, Campus Improvement and Eco Club and Gardening and Campus Cleanliness. 'SAVE' supplements the

curricular activities with extension and reach out programmes. 'SAVE' makes the students socially oriented and ensures the holistic development of the students.

Providing 'The Hindu' Newspaper

Providing 'The Hindu' Newspaper to the students at a low cost is to develop the reading habit of the students, to develop the vocabulary skill in English, to improve their level of general awareness and the knowledge of current affairs and thus making them perform well at competitive exams and also the regular reading habit contribute to the development of their personality.

Opening Bank Accounts, Bank loans & Passports

Our institution provides every support to the students for availing educational loans from banks. The educational loans are arranged under state and central government schemes. Further, our institution helps students to open bank accounts. The Institution assists the students in getting Passports too.

Neo Navigation

Neo Navigation Cell was formed during the academic year 2014-2015. M.Phil. students constitute the cell with a staff advisor. The purpose of the cell is to take recent developments/recent findings in a subject to students/community.

Ex-officio Cell

Ex-officio Cell was formed during the academic year 2014-2015 with the aim of evaluating the process of implementation of what is communicated to the Staff by the Management through Staff Meeting or otherwise and ensuring the implementation. Ex-officio Cell also acts as a mechanism which provides information for the top Management to review the activities of the institution. The Ex-officio Cell reviews the minutes of Staff Council meeting, Staff meeting and Students' Council meeting.
